Our environmental and responsible business strategy and plan to be net zero by 2035 provides the framework through which we fulfil these obligations and align with the requirements of the ISO 14001 standard. Environmental performance is published in the Trustmarque Group Annual Accounts and Carbon Reduction plan (CRP)

Ultima and Livingstone are committed to promoting environmentally sound practices and seek the cooperation of all employees, suppliers, and visitors for this purpose.

We will:

- Fully outline our statutory requirements and follow best practice
- Set environmental objectives and comparable metrics over multi-year period to ensure continual improvement through our CRP
- Monitor our environmental impacts and have systems in place to address non-compliance with legal requirements or with our Strategy
- Reduce our environmental impacts by:
 - Using resources sustainably
 - Reducing our greenhouse gas emissions by engaging with key suppliers in our supply chain, reducing energy consumption, improving energy efficiency, increasing the use of renewable energy, and seeking sustainable alternatives in transportation
 - Reducing waste and maintaining a 'zero waste to landfill' policy
 - Promoting education and awareness of environmental issues
 - Identify, evaluate, and appropriately control environmental risks and opportunities arising from our activities and working practices
- Seek to implement sustainable practices within our supply chain through improved supplier selection, contractual terms and conditions, and in-contract assurance
- Encourage collaboration through promoting education and awareness of environmental issues to our employee network.

This policy statement will be reviewed annually, or earlier if required, by the Executive Leadership Team.

Our procedures are designed to align to the International Standard for Environmental Management: ISO 14001. To verify that they do, and that we continue to operate them correctly, they will be internally audited.
